

## Pet Quality of Life Scale

*This scale was adapted from Dr. Alice Villalobos's book Canine and Feline Geriatric Oncology, Honoring the Human-Animal Bond. This rating scale is meant to assist caretakers and veterinary staff in deciding the best treatments for the pet as well as their effectiveness in maintaining the pet's comfort.*

**Rate the pet in the following areas on a scale of 1-10,  
with 10 being the best score**

HURT: *Is the pet experiencing pain? If so, can that pain be managed?*

HUNGER: *Is the pet eating enough to maintain weight?*

HYGIENE: *Can the pet be kept clean?*

HYDRATION: *Is the pet drinking enough, or are additional fluids needed?*

HAPPINESS: *Does the pet have enjoyable experiences on a daily basis?*

MOBILITY: *Is the pet able to move on its own or with assistance?*

MORE GOOD DAYS THAN BAD: *A bad day is filled with undesirable experiences, which may include depression, vomiting, nausea, diarrhea, frustration, falling down, seizures, or unmanageable symptoms.*
